Thanks to our thousands of generous donors, engaged community members, and our volunteer board, VCSF has raised more than \$3.75 million to support the dreams of students over the last 38 years.

We find a scholarship for every student who submits a notebook. At our annual ceremony, every student learns about their scholarship awards and hears a spoken tribute about their individual journey. Recipients will have two years to use their scholarship award funds, after which time the award money will be passed on to another student in a future class.

Scholarship Notebook Deadline – Digital & Physical Turn-In

All students will turn in a completed scholarship notebook at VHS **and** upload a digital copy at a link that will be posted in the Student section of our website.

Your notebook contents should be organized in the following order:

- 1. Title Page with photo and name
- 2. Personal Resume (2 pages)
- 3. Personal Essay
- 4. Two Signed Letters of Recommendation
- Four Collage Pages
- 6. Transcript digital version only
- 7. Student Bio (2-3 sentences)

May 21st REQUIRED: Scholarship Awards Ceremony 5:30pm @Open Space

Students must attend the ceremony to receive scholarship awards. Donors will be present.

May 30th <u>DUE: Thank You Notes & Education Plan Form</u> @ VHS Office

To claim scholarship funds, turn in by the end of this week:

- One thank-you note and envelope for each scholarship award received—each one stamped and addressed to the donor(s), with the student's return address NOTE: Scholarship funds will not be disbursed until thank you note(s) received
- Education Plan Form, including where you plan to go to school OR request to defer (let us know of any change in plans or schools as soon as you know)

What are your hopes and dreams for your life after high school?

• I am looking forward to riding my bike across the country and to going to a small arts school where I can focus on learning about the performing arts so I can become a full-time actor.



Instructions for Personal Essay

Your personal essay is your chance to use your voice to help those reading your notebook get a sense of you as a person. Rather than simply reiterating the personal data from your resume, use this part of the notebook to help prospective donors to get to know you.

Possible topics:

Events, people, or places who have influenced you and why. Think challenges and "aha" moments that have inspired your thinking or actions.

A special interest or challenge and why it is important to you or what it has taught you.

What has led or inspired you to want to further your knowledge with more study or training?

Tell us something that you think is important for us to know about you that is not covered in your resume or elsewhere in your notebook.

Some Things to Consider:

- Essays must be at least one full page long.
- Ask someone to proofread your essay. If an essay has numerous spelling and grammatical errors, we may ask you to correct them and resubmit so that donors are not distracted by the errors as they get to know you through your notebook.
- Do not share information that you do not want shared publicly. You are giving permission for your essay to be read by scholarship donors, board members, and the selection panel, who are members of your small community.
- Information from your notebook will be included in the ceremony. Both as we introduce you and your scholarship(s) and in a multimedia display.
- WARNING ABOUT AI-GENERATED ESSAYS: The essays that have been generated by AI have been among the worst we have read. Not only does addressing your topic in your own personal and quirky way give you an opportunity to reflect, but those very personal and quirky attributes are also what makes your notebook come alive. A wise person put it this way: "Why should I bother reading something someone can't be bothered to write?"



Instructions for Letters of Recommendation

How to request a letter of recommendation from a teacher and a community member:

Choose 2 individuals who can describe your strengths.

- 1. Ask only one teacher for a letter of recommendation for your notebook.
- 2. Ask one community member for a letter of recommendation for your notebook. A coach or mentor can qualify as a community member, even if they are also a teacher, because they know you outside the classroom setting.

These letters may NOT be written by peers/friends or family members such as parents, stepparents, siblings, aunts, uncles, or grandparents.

Approach the individuals early (by mid-October) so they have ample opportunity to compose and type their letter for you. Ask them this: Would they write a letter to help scholarship donors learn about you (what strengths you have shown, what challenges you have overcome, how you show up for others)? Request they give you their letters by mid-November to early December at the latest. The letters must be signed, whether digital or printed.

At the bottom of the <u>Commitment Form</u>, due November 6th, indicate from whom you have requested letters of recommendation.

Check back with your letter writers by the third week in November, at the latest, if you have not yet received the letters. It is your responsibility to obtain the letters before December 23rd (Winter Break) and include them in your notebook for submission on Thursday, January 9th. If printed, take a good quality scan or photo for the digital version of your notebook—Vashon Public Library has a scanner, as does Vashon Print & Design uptown.

Make and keep copies of your letters of recommendation. You may want to use them again for your college applications.

When you request a letter of recommendation, you are asking a favor.

An organized, courteous request makes a good impression, and a verbal thank you or a simple thank-you note is so appreciated.



Instructions for the Bio for the Ceremony Program

We would like you to write your own short biography to be printed in the VCSF ceremony program.

- Your bio will introduce you to the community in 2-3 sentences.
- At the top of the bio, print your name as you want it to appear in the program.

Be specific. Be positive. Be honest. Be yourself.

Submit a copy of your typed bio as the last page of your scholarship notebook. We may make some edits to fit the ceremony program.

Sample 2-3 Sentence Bios:

Meet all deadlines. Plan to finish early, allowing yourself time to solve any last-minute issues.

We strive to give every applicant equal opportunity. Requests for a deadline extension due to health issues or circumstances that are beyond the student's control will *be considered* by the board. Proofread your entire notebook early to have plenty of time to make corrections. Ask at least one person to proofread your notebook. They will catch what you miss—even your favorite author needs an editor.

Donors really love the collage pages! These pages are a creative visual display about you—they should reflect your personality and interests.

You should keep a copy of your scholarship notebook. The items you include in your application may be useful when making applications for college, other scholarships, or employment. You will not have access to your hard copy notebook again until we return it to you at the Scholarship Ceremony in May.

We are Matchmakers, not Gatekeepers! Our Donors, the Community Selection Panel, and the VCSF Board award scholarships by matching each scholarship's criteria to a student's interests, achievements, and aspirations. We read around 100 notebooks every year and every year we develop respect and tender hearts for every single one!

Help Us Make a Match:

- Put a lot of thought into what you say about yourself and how the pages will look to the reader. Neatness, accuracy, and correct spelling make a very positive impression.
- Your scholarship notebook should be an honest reflection of your personality, interests, accomplishments, and priorities. The world needs the one and only you!
- Remember that every notebook is viewed by several members of the greater Vashon Community. Give only details that you would be comfortable sharing publicly.

VCSF and its donors may publish my name and general biographical information in announcements of scholarship awards.
